We are well into the midst of winter, as the cold weather and increased bouts of illness among both the people we support and our staff clearly show.

It's with great admiration and appreciation that I share some of the recent successes achieved by Amy Pawson, our Fundraising Manager, since our last newsletter. Amy has worked tirelessly to secure funding and build relationships that directly benefit our organisation.

A major highlight is a generous donation from the Hugo Charitable Trust, which has enabled us to purchase two wheelchair-accessible vans and a 12-seater minibus. These are the very first brand-new vehicles in our fleet, and we are incredibly proud to see them on the road. Keep an eye out — they proudly display both our logo and that of the Hugo Trust. Our heartfelt thanks go to the wonderful team at Hugo for their support.

We've also received partial funding from Pub Charity for an office Hush Pod. This addition to our open-plan admin area provides a much-needed private space for meetings, online communication, and focused work.

In addition, Amy has successfully secured funding from other grant applications and has been actively engaged in marketing and communications, which you may have noticed through updates on our website and Facebook page.


Activities included a petting farm, craft projects, a delicious lunch, and even a disco!

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A Fairytale Ending After a Challenging Chapter for The Chris Ruth Centre Trust

What began as an exceptionally difficult period for The Chris Ruth Centre Trust has found a heartwarming and hopeful conclusion. After the devastating theft of five mobility vans in just seven months during 2023, the Chris Ruth Centre is celebrating a major boost—thanks to the incredible generosity of the Hugo Charitable Trust, which has donated three brand-new vans.

The thefts severely limited the Trust's ability to provide essential community access and engagement for those we support. While the Trust managed to replace the stolen vans with secondhand vehicles, it faced a funding shortfall of around \$30,000—money that could have been spent enhancing services.

Now, thanks to the support from Hugo Charitable Trust, the Chris Ruth Centre has welcomed a 12-seater minivan, and one of two wheelchairaccessible vans, the third currently being sourced for the Trust. This is a timely gift that restores not just transportation, but also dignity, inclusion, and joy.

"The arrival of these new vans is a mana-enhancing moment for the people we support," said Marilyn Paston, CEO of The Chris Ruth Centre Trust. "As a charitable organisation, we've never had the means to purchase brand-new vehicles. This is a dream come true."

The Hugo Charitable Trust, founded in 2017 by Maryanne Green to carry on the legacy of her father Hugh Green, has become a powerful force in New Zealand's charitable sector. With over \$85 million in capital and more than \$19 million in donations distributed to date, the Trust continues to make tangible, lasting differences in communities across the country.

The Chris Ruth Centre Trust extends its deepest thanks to the Hugo Charitable Trust for their life-changing support—not just for the donation of

the vans, but for believing in the power of inclusion and mobility.

"This truly is a fairytale ending," said Paston. "And we're so grateful to be part of the Hugo Charitable Trust's story of generosity."
